Referral service aids members

Adjusting to a new home on an unfamiliar base is part of the military way of life. Most newcomers are anxious to make the new base their 'home sweet home'.

For overseas service members in the ranks of E-3 and below with families, these adjustments can be more difficult than for others

While Congress pays for the accompaniment of the families, it does not give these folks enough weight allowance on their PCS move to enable them to bring some housing necessities with them. Nor does it allow the base to provide these necessities, such as stoves, refrigerators, beds, etc., to the member.

"We're literally handcuffed in the help we can offer these people," said Col. Michael Richardson, 432d Combat Support Group commander.

Jackie Hill, coordinator of the E-4 and below referral service, likes to think she has at least one alternative to this 'catch-22'.

The E-4 and below referral service provides furniture, appliances, and other items free of charge to those with a need.

This service is available to all service members E-3 and below or E-4 with less than 2 years active duty service.

The organization receives donations from other military members who wish to help those in need. Any piece of furniture, appliances, and other household goods are welcome.

What the referral doesn't have in their inventory or what hasn't been donated, they usually try to buy.

Being a non-profit private organization, it sponsors fund-raising activities to help the cause.

A recently held fashion show netted a profit for the organization and provided them with the funds to purchase nine kerosene heaters, items that are a must for living off-base in the winter.

"I don't know what we would have done without Jackie's help," said Sondra Burton, wife of A1C Dennis Burton. "We still don't have a stove yet, but we're working on it."

"We have a pretty ample supply of goods for people who need them and we also can loan things to single people living off-base who can't afford to buy some of the larger items. This is done by a waiting list system and if the item is available, we loan it on a 6-month basis, with the option of renewing," Mrs. Hill stated. Jackie's program fills a big need on this base. What we can't give these kids, she does her best to come up with," Col. Richardson said.

"I wanted to help those who needed help and this was the best way I could think of," Mrs. Hill continued.

The referral service is spearheaded by Mrs. Hill and is comprised of all volunteers who contribute in various areas. Some of the volunteers store items in their homes since their is a lack of storage space for the group.

"In the states there is a similar program through the Air Force called MAST, Married Airmen Sharing Together. While it's not an appropriate title for Misawa, with all the different services here, this is basically what we have set out to do; provide trec service for those who need it," said Mrs. Hill.

For now, the E-4 and below referral service is one of the ways folks at Misawa have of making their cff-base house 'home sweet home '
